I only read this short story because it was free online, and I could check it out easily via a link in one of my groups. As it turned out, it definitely isn't my cup of tea but I felt it would be unfair to rate it negatively on that account, just because I'm not the target audience. I'm also not counting these short comments as a real review, and indeed this would be very difficult to review without a major spoiler or two. But I can say categorically that it's a very dark, grisly and pessimistic tale. Despite the child narrator, it's absolutely not children's literature unless you want the children to be in therapy for a long, long time, and so would probably appeal to those who like that sort of thing. Indeed, it's effective in terms of emotional impact in somewhat the same way that a baseball bat slammed full force into your stomach would be effective, but the premise and details actually do not stand up to examination very well, IMO. Like R L Stine in too much of his work, Wheaton strains so hard for the surprise ending that he violates the internal logic of the story. I read this extremely short story back when the author first released it on his blog. I figured, it's free and short, what could I lose by giving it a whirl? I ended up enjoying it so much that I loaded it onto my Kindle so I could read it again at my leisure. That's what I did today, and I figured I'd write a little review this time, too. As I already mentioned, this is a very short story. Micro story would be a good descriptor. Its length is akin to that of a children's picture book but the content couldn't be farther from that. This is definitely not for children/adolescents, sure, if the parents aren't too squeamish. Despite the story's brevity,
